The Eighth World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia is an occasion for Catholics from around the world to reflect on family life, and the role that families can play in strengthening our society and our Catholic faith." The theme of this meeting, which is offered every three years is, *Love is Our Mission: The Family Fully Alive*.

In addition to educational sessions, there will be many attractions including a world market place, art, music and film festivals. It is anticipated that over 153 nations will be represented and hoped that Pope Francis will offer the Mass for the Festival of Families at the stairs of the Philadelphia Art Museum on Saturday, September 26, 2015.

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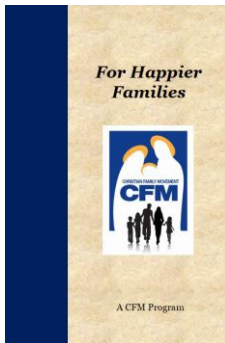
Many CFM Programs to Choose From

Volunteers from across the country have worked to create a variety

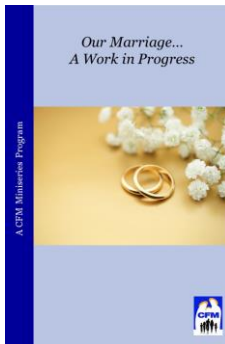

The Bishops Find a Pulse on the State of the Family

In October 2013, the Vatican announced the convening of an Extraordinary Synod of Bishops on the "Pastoral Challenges of the Family in the Context of Evangelization" for October 2014. Shortly thereafter, the Secretary General of the Synod of Bishops, Cardinal Baldisseri, asked the world's bishops to submit feedback about the acceptance of Church teaching regarding marriage and the family and the state of pastoral care of marriages and families. Many bishops invited perspectives from lay men and women, in response to Baldisseri's request to share the questionnaire "as widely as possible" in order to obtain "input from local sources."

In advance of the meeting this October, which will consist of a limited number of bishops (with all of the bishops convening in the fall of 2015 on the same topic), the Vatican released a document known as the "[Instrumentum Laboris](#)," which summarizes the responses received from bishops throughout the world on topics regarding marriage and family that concern the Church hierarchy and laity.

A Gospel Meditation for the Home

Matthew 15:21-28
August 17, 2014

...

In today's gospel we are introduced to an "outsider" with a mission, who won't take "no" for an answer.

She was persistent almost to a fault. She was a Canaanite, a group that inhabited Israel for as long as anyone could remember. Their religious practice was partly focused on increasing fertility for themselves and for their fields. They worshipped on the hilltops. Good Jews stayed clear of them. Except in this story.

During the lifetime of Jesus, he enjoyed many colorful encounters with individuals whom some Jews would consider unclean and foreign. This particular woman had two strikes against her. She was a woman and a Canaanite. At first, Jesus appeared to want nothing to do with her. He tries to escape her request, almost pushing her aside. Given how the account eventually concludes, this is great theatrics. The Gospel of Matthew loves drama.

She wanted a healing from Jesus, not for herself, but for her daughter who was tormented by demons. Some commentators think this might be a reference to a mental illness of some kind. Whatever it was, her mother (like so many caring mothers) would do anything to make her well. She seemingly ignored the indifference of Jesus and his disciples. She was on a mission and would not be turned back.

Eventually she broke through the religious and cultural barriers of the time and connected with Jesus. What else could he do but respond with love and concern? This is a great gospel for families and individuals facing difficulties. Jesus has a special place in his heart for those struggling to survive. As does Pope Francis. Jesus opened his heart and power in his healing the daughter of the Canaanite mom. He continues to have that same care for challenged families and individuals today, no matter what their religious or social condition. Just ask.

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
