
Getting CFM Up and Running:

Any CFM group can follow this plan from St. John’s CFM in Tucson:

Spread the word about CFM by word of mouth and in the bulletin (See above). Sign up all interested families after Mass or by phone and email. Collect donations and have people fill out the [membership form](#) or have a tablet available for them to [register online](#). Then, create group lists, using criteria of your choice: same-age children, diverse-age adults, various meeting nights, or any mixture you judge will be beneficial. People can readjust, as needed.

Next, hold an Introductory Meet and Greet for everyone at the parish hall to go over, as a whole group, the group agreement, the format for meetings and social events, and brief history of CFM.

Then, have them break up into their "premade" action groups for a "get-to-know-you icebreaker" and to plan out the dates of the meetings. Discuss and decide which months each group would like to volunteer to coordinate the social/ service events. Brainstorm possible ideas for action during the year.



Called to Justice: A CFM Program for Everyday Christianity

Concerned about conflicts in today’s society and looking for how your group can fruitfully discuss and plan relevant action? This 6-meeting program guides small groups to

observe life at work, at home, and in the public square, then decide how to follow Jesus in practical action as citizens of today’s society, guided by the US Catholic Bishops’ Pastoral Reflection, *Everyday*

Christianity: To Hunger and Thirst for Justice. Your group could sponsor an evening of reflection using one of these chapters: Family and Work Pressures; Fairness in the Workplace; Consumerism and Materialism; Family as Church in the World; Politics and the Christian Family; A Call to Stewardship.

Partnering to Help Veterans
